Preparing our hearts for Christmas

Many of us are actually busy during this period, but for some of us, we are not as busy as the previous years. It is a strange year, indeed. But I think, this year, 2020, provides us a precious (and maybe, rare) opportunity to ponder even deeper about what is the true meaning of Christmas.

What do we anticipate?

When we get into December, are we thrilled by the birth of Christ? Are we consumed by the joy of our salvation? Are we stunned with awe and adoration by the beginning of God's redemptive plan for us? If we want to be honest, many times we look forward more towards the celebratory, things like holiday, giftexchange, or gathering, which are all good by nature. But if that's all that we're really looking forward to, then we miss entirely.

C.S Lewis once said, "we are half-hearted creatures, fooling about with drink and sex and ambition when infinite joy is offered us, like an ignorant child who wants to go on making mud pies in a slum because he cannot imagine what is meant by the offer of a holiday at the sea. We are far too easily pleased."

Isn't that the imagery of our hearts' condition most of the time? It is so tragic that the world captures our heart so deep that the glory of Christ's birth just passed by like an annual festival. At this time, I think we need to remind ourselves that even the best holiday we had or the gift we wanted the most will not satisfy

the deepest of my heart. I am not created for that. Oh, how our hearts need to be awakened by the true and lasting joy rather than those superficial and fleeting pleasures.

Preparing for the true and lasting joy

If you're like me, who is easily distracted or side-tracked by the non-fundamental things, then there is no better time to refocus our attention to the most precious one. There are many ways we can recalibrate our hearts to the first importance, the birth of the Saviour. Two things, I think, will help us.

First, read (again) the Gospel, be immersed in the person of Christ Jesus, and behold the meekness of the King of Glory born in a manger. Second, get an Advent devotional. A daily Advent devotional will slow our days in our fast-paced culture that prizes busyness. The art of meditating the Bible is clearly lost in our digitised age. We numb our spiritual tastebud by spending hours in front of the screen. For such reasons, the least I can do, is to get help from external resources to refresh my heart.

Of course, they are not prescriptive at all.

We can do a lot of other stuff, such as journaling, studying the Bible in a group, listening to sermons, reading good books, and many more. The point is that we long for our hearts to see and savour the glory of Christ in this season. And the evidence of our longing is our efforts to stir up our hearts. I believe God hears the longing of His people and He will satisfy those who seek Him wholeheartedly.

Come, let us adore Him

One of the biggest mysteries of Christmas is that the King of Kings and Lord of Lords was born as a baby in a manger. His mission was to glorify the Father and save us, sinners. Jesus could've come as a King and rule over the earth. But he didn't. Instead, "... though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross." (Philippians 2:6-8).

When we try to grasp the majesty of Christ shown in meekness, we will be utterly blown by His peculiar glory. He is the radiance of God's glory. He upholds the universe by the word of His power. But He is also the same God that experiences thirst, fatigue, and trouble. He came to the world He created not to be treated as a king, but a man of sorrow. As Isaiah prophesied,

"But he was pierced for our transgressions;

he was crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the chastisement that brought us peace,

and with his wounds we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray;

we have turned—every one—to his own way;

and the Lord has laid on him

the iniquity of us all."

(Isaiah 53:5-6)

This season invites us once again to ponder about our salvation. How unscrutinised is God's wisdom, who would have comprehended? So, shall we make every effort to see and savour our Saviour? Or shall we settle on movies, holiday, and gifts? Prepare the season well, and we will experience the inexpressible joy that can only come from the Lord.

"To influence, or be Influenced?"

Since we married, I have noticed some positive influences my husband has brought to my life and characters. Let me share just one of them here.

My husband is one of the most simple-living men l've known. He only buys what he needs and doesn't like to accumulate things. I like to shop when there is a sale and think that "I have saved", but in my husband's opinion, not to shop at all is the best option to save. He has taught me to think wisely and to draw a clearer line between "needs" and "wants". I have learnt an invaluable lesson: "Just because I can, doesn't mean I have to buy it". In doing so he is still a generous person and willing to share what he has with others in need.

At first this prudent lifestyle didn't come naturally for me. Afterall for more than twenty years I had been raised within a different family background where "saving money" wasn't really the most important life lesson, in fact, it was rarely discussed. My mother taught me to be independent since I was little, but more towards having the ability to do things on my own like cooking, cleaning, and juggling priorities in life so I could serve my family well when "one day" I myself became a mother. Now that I am a mother of two, indeed I have found this very useful and I could easily adapt to living abroad without a helper just because I had been used to.

When I asked him in return in what way I have influenced him throughout our years of togetherness, his answer was my spirituality which has inspired and motivated him in seeking God amidst his busyness and exhausting working days.

I can see that the closer personally and physically others are to us, the greater our influence over them, and vice versa.

Remember when Jesus said in **Matthew 5:13**,

"You are the salt of the earth. But if the salt loses its saltiness, how can it be made salty again? It is no longer good for anything, except

to be thrown out and trampled underfoot".

With the increasing growth in the digital era, it is more visible for us to reach out to others through the internet and social media even to those who are in the other parts of the world. Nonetheless, I believe the immediate people who can "taste our saltiness" are essentially those closest to us; our own spouse, children, siblings, parents, friends, house mates, work colleagues, even down to our neighbors.

Regardless of what ministries or "noble activities" I do outside of the four walls of my home, if my own husband and children don't see myself growing to have Christ-like characters, then I need to examine closely the true state of my personal relationship with Christ.

Have I abided daily in Him?

Salt in itself is a very stable substance. It is unusual, almost impossible, for salt not to be salty. "If it is not salty, it is not salt". Salt doesn't need to force itself to be salty, it is simply its nature. Similarly, when one is truly attached to the True Vine (Jesus Himself), it will be inevitable for him/her not to bear any fruit! **G** We live

either to influence others or he influenced, we simply cannot live and interact with others within a community and stay the same.

The fruit of the spirit (Galatians 5:22-23) isn't something that we can force nor speed up the process.

We need to hold on to God's own promise in John 15:5,

"I am the vine; you are the branches. **If you remain in Me and I in you**, you <u>will</u> bear much fruit; apart from Me you can do nothing".

We need to focus our heart and commit our time first and foremostly **to remain in Christ.**

Eventually it's not merely our knowledge about the Bible and Christian doctrine that define us as Christ's followers, but the fruits (influence) others get to taste.

Moreover, the most important people I want to bring a good influence to is, firstly, my own children.

I desire for them to grow knowing their true worth and value in Christ, one that is not defined by the social media or approvals from others. That they are daughters of Christ, redeemed by precious blood of Christ, created for God's good works, and to live differently (set apart) from this world.

And the best way to teach them is for myself living up to this truth. Many times, I am unaware that my children are copying what I said and did. Countless times I come in repentance because I am not being careful with my words and actions. If you're also a parent, our everyday activities bring opportunity for learning and to influence our children whether to live for God, or for our own agenda, busy life, and pleasures. Our home is our children's first classroom.

Furthermore, 2 Corinthians 3:2-3 says that, "You yourselves are our letter, written on our hearts, **known and read by everyone.**

You show that **you are a letter from Christ**, the result of our ministry, written not with ink but with **the Spirit of the living God**, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of human hearts".

Once again, let's draw close to Christ and remain in Him.

2 Corinthians 3:5

"Not that we are competent in ourselves to claim anything for ourselves, but **our competence comes from God.**"

When the world becomes too attractive, when we fail to love Him above all else as we should, when we are feeling unmotivated and hopeless in our journey following Jesus, remember there is only one thing, the best thing, we need to take part: **sitting at the feet of Jesus and listen to what He says** (*Luke 10:39*).

Luke 10:41-42

"Martha, Martha," the Lord answered, "you are worried and upset about many things,

but few things are needed—or indeed only one. Mary has chosen what is better, and **it will not be taken away from her**."
