





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God Desires Your Heart, Not Your Grades

It is no wonder why the exam period can be a dreadful period for most, if not, all students.

Grades are the currency of our education. There is no doubt about it. The higher one's grade is, the more likely they enter a better college, score a better job, and be appreciated and praised by their families and friends. Grades become the measurement of our progress and a determining factor for our success in life. And while the grading system is not necessarily bad, it does not go hand in hand with our nature of sinfulness.

With every performance-based measurement system comes the desire for humans to strive for all the wrong reasons. When we receive excellent grades, we feel proud because our hard work has paid off. But when the contrary happens, we feel ashamed, bitter, and even think our effort is not being justly assessed. Then our hearts start to get into turmoil. We start to compare ourselves with others' performances. We start to think that our future will

be hopeless and ruined if we get a passing grade, or even worse, the word 'fail' engraved on our academic report.

We start to feel grade becoming the deciding factor for our happiness and hope. The states of our heart, soul, and mind are dependent on the score we receive. Grade is no longer the measurement of our performance, it has become an idol in our heart.
